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SENATOR CHAMBERS: They might be doing a little of both.

SENATOR BURLING: Yeah.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: They're in that gray area where people may not be sure exactly what it is they're doing. They might be operating just within the law so that nobody could put the grabs on them and say you go to jail because you have committed a crime.

SENATOR BURLING: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think that there are manufacturers and industry people who produce products that are sold to various governmental agencies?

SENATOR BURLING: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And have you read articles where they grossly overcharge for those items when they're dealing with a government agency, and they would not overcharge in the same way on the open market?

SENATOR BURLING: I've read those articles.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And some of those types of people are on boards and commissions. They're representatives, maybe a CEO, a chief financial officer. Those kind of people are on these boards. So it would not be incorrect to suggest that some representatives of some industries in manufacturing do raid the public till by overcharging when they're dealing with a governmental agency. That could...that is an accurate statement, isn't it?

SENATOR BURLING: Could be.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think the mere fact that a representative of an industry or manufacturer who manages to persuade the government to pay more for an item than ought to be paid, that such an industry or manufacturer should not have representation on this board when what was done was not actually
