SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. And you think if a criminal is elected then the criminal ought to be allowed to stay in that position to which he was elected, correct?

SENATOR BURLING: Well, I'm not a judge. I'm not an attorney.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How many criminals do you know who are in office that you think should be there?

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BURLING: I don't know.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did you say time, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: I said one minute, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. You know of one criminal who's in office right now, correct?

SENATOR BURLING: I suppose.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. And you think that...let's say alleged criminal.

SENATOR BURLING: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You...but the criminal has admitted violating criminal law, so he can qualify as a criminal. You think that criminal, if he sits on the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska, should be allowed to stay there, is that your view, because he was elected?

SENATOR BURLING: I don't have a view on that right now.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think a bank robber should be allowed to be on the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska if the people elect him?
