SENATOR BURLING: No, doesn't erase that. It just...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think students should practice criminal behavior and still be...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...allowed to be considered...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...students in good standing?

SENATOR BURLING: No.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Heard the opening on the Chambers amendment, FA334, to LB 542. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion of the Chambers amendment, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'd like to ask Senator Burling a few more questions.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Burling, would you respond?

SENATOR BURLING: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Burling, my amendment does not deal with criminals. My amendment does not deal with people who have committed crimes. My amendment deals with those who are sharp operators, who are able to get, for their products, more from the state than they would get on the private market, or the open market. You've seen situations like that, haven't you, before?

SENATOR BURLING: Yes.
