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rent or a tear in that which is old. If you cut the new cloth to fit the hole that is torn in the old material, when you wash it, based on what the "Bibble" said, that new material is going to shrink, and when it shrinks, it's going to open the tear once again. So you don't put a new piece of cloth into an old garment and you don't pour new wine into old bottles. And the bottles they were talking about were skins, and when the new wine went through its fermenting process, it would have a deleterious effect on the old bottles, as they were called. This comparison that Senator Burling's bill is talking about is going to give information that we don't need to commission a commission to obtain. We don't need to spend a large amount of money to do that. There are people who could probably take these gadgets of the kind that sit on our desks and, of an afternoon or morning or evening, get us a comparison between what's happening in Nebraska taxwise and other states. But since I'm old-school and don't work these gadgets, maybe I'm overestimating what a person can do with them. I'd like to ask Senator Burling a question at this juncture.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Burling, would you respond?

SENATOR BURLING: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Burling, if you recall, what is the amount that will be spent to carry out the purposes of this bill?

SENATOR BURLING: On General File, we amended the A bill to read that \$250,000 would be allowed.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And I was the one who offered that amendment. And do you remember my saying that I offered it, not that I liked the bill, but if a study was to be undertaken and you were going to get competent people to do it, you'd have to have enough money to make the study credible. Do you remember me making that argument?

SENATOR BURLING: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And once again now, the amount that will be
