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paper. And I'd write back and say, that's exactly what Senator Foley says can suffer serious bodily harm, that which you cannot see with the naked eye. But they don't know anything. They're following the party line. They're following what Senator Foley tells them. And it shows how uninformed the public is. I had said all along, when we had these bills trying to create personhood for a fetus, that I would not hesitate to enhance penalties against anybody who harmed a pregnant woman. But the woman is the victim. The woman is the point of reference for me. And it always will be that way. She is the center of this universe. You know something else people ask me: Well, suppose your mother had aborted you? Well, if she had, you wouldn't have me talking here; I wouldn't even know anything. What kind of stupid question is that? But that's the kind of questions these simpleminded people ask.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Chambers. And that...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: For me to be quiet? Okay.

SENATOR CUDABACK: That was your third time. Senator Redfield, on the Chambers amendment.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I'm glad that Senator Schimek has returned to the floor, because she was asking why we didn't enhance penalties for assaulting a pregnant woman. And I would remind you that we're not talking about homicide here; we are talking about assault. And if in fact an unborn child is damaged, they are the ones who face a life of perhaps disability that is long-term. And so they, independently, will suffer the consequences of this act. Now, you might say that the mother suffers, and she does, because she's been assaulted. You would say that she has suffered because her child has been harmed. You would say that she has suffered because she will have a great deal of care and burden in caring for that child if they indeed suffer a disability. But most of all, you cannot say that she will suffer for a full lifetime in the way that this child may face, whether they have lost the use of a limb, or the loss of their sight, or perhaps a brain damage that will affect their entire future. It is ultimately the child who will suffer the
