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consequences and therefore, in my mind, it is a separate crime and a separate victim. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Redfield. Senator Schimek. Senator Schimek waives her time. Further discussion on the Chambers amendment? There are no lights on. Senator Chambers, you're recognized to close on FA204.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, Senator Redfield stands up here and makes her comments and says, we're not talking about fetal homicide. We all know that. What we're talking about is a set of circumstances where a woman is pregnant, and any attack on that woman is an attack on that woman. I want to ask Senator Redfield a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Redfield, would you yield?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Redfield, if I understand your position,...no, let me ask you. Do you think life, notice I'm saying "life," begins at conception?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Yes, I do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think, at conception, a full-fledged human being exists?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Senator, full-fledged in the sense of fully grown? No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, no, not physically speaking. Do you believe that a human being...when the egg is fertilized, it's called a zygote. Do you believe the zygote is a human being?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Yes, I do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Does that zygote have a body, in your view?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Microscopically.
