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be a couple of small losers, like the NRDs and the community colleges. But that pot of money is not that large. Is that...I'll leave...I'll give you the rest of my time to comment. I'm not...I'm just trying to be sure I have the complete picture. I would yield to Senator Baker.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Baker.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Senator Beutler. That is exactly correct. Senator Beutler is a little under the weather with his voice, but that is exactly correct. We're transferring this money. Probably 60 percent of this money would go to school districts, and the rest of it is disbursed to the NRDs and the cities and counties and all the other political subdivisions, as any county is organized. It will be made...the equalized school districts will be made whole through the TEEOSA formula, state school aid formula. Senator Raikes' objection to that is, he doesn't want to do this at this time, I guess. We are continually increasing funding to schools through TEEOSA. Address a couple of other issues: Senator Stuthman and Senator Brown did vote against this bill, because they have two unequalized school districts, meaning Columbus Lakeview and Westside. And I have to admit, I talked to the superintendent at Columbus Lakeview and I was low on the figures that I gave him. But the figures that we have here, and I think you're quoting from are a year old, and they are considerably less now than what is on this printout that I have. I do not have a new printout as to what districts are going to lose that are those nonequalized districts. I mean, I wish all the districts were nonequalized. We wouldn't have a state aid problem then, and to complain about being a rich district--and that's just what we're talking about here, folks--lots of valuation per student. They don't even qualify for state aid, and for Senator Stuthman and Senator Brown to complain about that, I wish we had that problem across the state. And granted, it's going to take a few dollars away from them. I understand that. That's the reason they voted against the bill. They had to, because they represent those school districts. So...and another issue I'd like to address. Senator Brown brought up...she'd like...several people have come before the Transportation and the Revenue Committee with proposals to change the formula. We've not moved any of
