I've had them call and say, well, you know, the police can't be everywhere, so we have to take care of things. These are not the people you want taking care of things. This is a scary thing, and I'm afraid of what's going to happen to us when this happens here, and also, the people who have to enforce We should be listening to our police chiefs, the people who have to administer and deal with these situations, and also think about how this bill has been crafted, the problems that are in the bill. That's part of our duty as legislators. So I urge you to vote no on the cloture vote. Thank you.
