do what you're talking about now or to demonstrate that he or she has done that. Isn't that true?

SENATOR COMBS: That is true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. The only thing they have to do is get the permit. How much is the fee for re-upping?

SENATOR COMBS: A hundred bucks.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did you hear Senator Cornett point out that these officers recertify periodically? Did you hear her answer?

SENATOR COMBS: Yes, I did.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. If police officers have to recertify that often, why do you think these people who are going to be carrying guns--and they can carry them in childcare centers, domestic violence victim or sexual assault victim shelters, residence of another person without that person's permission, playgrounds or parks, public swimming pools, public recreation facilities, youth centers, airports, music concerts, and mental health facilities--why do you think they should not be required to show, whenever they re-up, that they maintain competency with that weapon?

SENATOR COMBS: I answered that about ten minutes ago, but I will answer it again. The concealed weapons permitholder is not taking the fight to the person. They are merely defending themselves when there is...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's not answering my question. I'm asking you, why, in view of what your bill allows, and the places I read off to you where they can take these weapons, why should they not be required to show that they remain competent?

SENATOR COMBS: They are taking them there now. And the chances that you are going to use that weapon...you don't use that weapon on a daily basis.
