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SENATOR COMBS: Where they're not prohibited, like on the street. If I had a concealed weapon, I don't think that I would carry it into a public place. I'd just keep it under my seat or...the purpose that I would carry one, personally, or keep one with me, would be in the case that I would be in a dangerous place, and I certainly would not expect in any of these places to be faced with a personal danger. And I certainly wouldn't carry it in my pocketbook. That's not what the training is. You know, you carry it next to your body if you carry it at all outside. And a major part of the safety is people don't know who has been trained in carrying and who doesn't, so that might provide some modicum of safety just from people not knowing who has them and who don't.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: What would you consider a dangerous place then?

SENATOR COMBS: That would be up to the person, wherever they're going. You know, a dangerous place, if...at one time, I did have a stalker, so to me, if I knew my stalker was in that place and I saw him in there through the window, to me that's a dangerous place. You know...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Don't you already have the right to go into court and get a concealed carry permit in those kinds of cases?

SENATOR COMBS: Sure, but I don't want to stay in jail until somebody says I'm okay to do it, and why should I when that's a, you know, a privilege that's been afforded under the U.S. Constitution that I just need to have a state law to make it...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: It says in the Second Amendment to the Constitution that you have a right to concealed carry?

SENATOR COMBS: Says we have a right to bear firearms.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, but that needs (laugh)...that needs definition. I mean, I don't disagree that there's a Second Amendment,...
