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SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, Senator Friend, I'm not going to ask you any more questions today, but thank you. And I've benefitted from our discussion. Members of the Legislature, over the weekend I'm going to have the opportunity to craft amendments to bills. And I know there are some people who think I'm just talking now and that I won't be able to carry through on what I've said, because they don't believe that I tell the truth when I speak. And since that's the attitude, I must demonstrate that I mean what I say. Some of my colleagues know that even if an amendment or 2, or 3, or 4, or 10, or 20 will show up on a bill, that is no indication necessarily that every one of those bill...those amendments will be taken and discussed at great length. I would like to ask my seatmate, the "Duchess," a question, and for the rest of you all, Senator Price.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Price, would you yield?

SENATOR PRICE: Yes, I would.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Price, have you seen occasions during the session when maybe I've put a lot of amendments on a bill and would decide, as some of them have been discussed, that whatever the point was I was trying to make had been made, and I would say the rest of the amendments I'm not going to pursue?

SENATOR PRICE: Yes, I noticed that on the preceding bill this morning. I looked at all of the amendments that you had filed.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now you're aware that one of your bills is on the list to come up soon. Is that true?

SENATOR PRICE: Yes, I'm anxiously awaiting it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you don't have heartburn or palpitations?

SENATOR PRICE: I look forward to a good, clean debate.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Price. That's all I would have. He or she who hath ears to hear, let him or her hear what was said during that exchange. If you only paid attention to the words that were spoken, you didn't get anything out of it.
