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kinds of misdemeanors not related to "in office," not related to the election, but if formerly charged and agreeing to a misdemeanor relating to their personal life, perhaps. There are certain types of things the public would be caught off guard, I think, if they thought that that was not a subject...appropriate subject for recall, things having to do with personal relationships, perhaps involving sexual matters, that sort of thing. So my question...I'm going to yield the rest of my time to Senator Chambers and to Senator Mines and to Senator Schimek, and ask the three of them on this basic, fundamental question of how narrow we want to make this, what they think about including those two other categories, i.e., violations in the election process, misdemeanors totally outside of either the election office...election process, or the office itself. And Senator Chambers, since it's...why would I ever yield you time? Well, I guess I have to on this occasion. I would yield to Senator Chambers, just to get his reaction to the whole situation.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, one minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, the approach that I took with my amendments was to merely make the law...the bill consistent. And the reason I added the words "in office" is because on page 3, in line 18, they use the term "in office" when they're talking about some of these other activities. So I felt if "in office" was going to be there, it should also be in these definitions. And after these amendments were adopted, if they were, then I would look at some of the issues Senator Beutler raised, because they are valid. But because of the types of amendments I'm offering, I didn't want to bring any that would substantially change the bill or substantively add or take away from it. But I believe he raised valid points, and we should consider them before we finish the bill. And I give back to Senator Beutler whatever time remains.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One second. Sorry, Senator Beutler. (Visitors introduced.) Senator Louden, followed by Senator Schimek and others.
