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on the Chambers amendment. Senator Brown, followed by Senator Landis.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, members, Senator Beutler said in his remarks that this would require something to...something obviously bad to have occurred in order for this to come into play. And having sat on the Government Committee and listened to some of the testimony about recall efforts, I really do think that there should be something demonstrable. And I don't know that "bad" is probably the correct word; "demonstrable" is a better word. And what I like about this bill is that it's fairly clear standards. And you will notice that the entire Government Committee voted to advance this bill, because we have listened to some of the stories about recall efforts, and there...we have corrected some of the more obvious problems in the past, but it's still not entirely clear that the people who sign the petitions always know exactly what they are signing, exactly what the issue that the elected official is being accused of is. And so I really do think having some standardization, having some language about what acts in office constitute a reason for recall, is very necessary. Now, as to Senator Chambers' amendment, I think that probably it clarifies things. I actually agree with Senator Schimek that because it refers to another section of law it is...it's clear enough. But if Senator Chambers thinks that it needs to be even more clear, then that's fine. And I've looked through some of Senator Chambers' other amendments, and I think that they're...most of them, at least the ones that I've read, are technical amendments to clean up the language of the bill. And I will tell you that we spent...the committee spent a great deal of time, Senator Mines spent a great deal of time, and it was a work in progress all the way along, in terms of the language of this bill. And so I appreciate Senator Chambers offering us any kind of help that we can have, in terms of the technical piece of it, because we want to be clear. I wondered if Senator Mines would yield to a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Mines, would you yield?

SENATOR MINES: Mr. President. Yes, Senator.
