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SENATOR BROWN: Thank you. Can you tell me...I think it was Senator Louden that raised the issue of us making the court...having a number of these come to court. Can you tell me the number of recalls there have been maybe per year in the last couple of years? Do you have any idea?

SENATOR MINES: I wish I did. I'm sorry, I don't.

SENATOR BROWN: Could you possibly see if you could find out that information?

SENATOR MINES: Absolutely. Absolutely.

SENATOR BROWN: Maybe Senator Schimek would have it. (Laugh) Okay. Senator Schimek is shaking her head.

SENATOR MINES: She's got a blank look on her face as well.

SENATOR BROWN: (Laugh) I think it would be useful to know what we're talking about in terms of scope. I don't think it's probably substantial in terms of the number of recalls that are initiated, and then you would diminish it further by the number that might potentially go to district court. But I do believe that having clear criteria in the law so that people on both sides understand what it is. And one of the things that we heard...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BROWN: ...that I thought was particularly concerning is that sometimes the recalls are initiated but never carried forward, but the black mark, the innuendo is carried by that elected official just by that activity. And so having some criteria, I believe, is very important. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Brown. (Visitors introduced.) Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, I'll see if I understand the process. I may ask for a confirmation, and then I'll make some reactions. It seems to me that there
