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SENATOR BEUTLER:    Okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK:    ...if you failed in the district court for any reason, you might want to come back and make your case in a different manner.

SENATOR BEUTLER:    Okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK:    Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK:    Thank you, Senator Schimek.      Further discussion.    Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS:    Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I did read through the committee amendment, and it does have a provision which says that on the petition there cannot be included a statement relative to whatever the court's decision had been. I'm sure that was put in by the committee to try to nullify what Senator Landis said might happen. However, every judicial proceeding in this state is open to the public. These recalls take place generally in small towns. The newspapers don't have a lot to write about, so they would be sending people to attend a court hearing of this kind, and they would write what the court's decision was. So even though it cannot be placed on the petition, as Senator Landis suggested, it is going to be made known throughout the community, and people will know whatever it was that the court decided. I'm going to explain again the process that I am following in my amending. I am not dealing with the philosophy behind recall as such, or the underpinnings of the committee's amendment. But I do see the need to change a lot of the language to make it clear and to state more precisely, especially when you get to a judicial proceeding, the way certain ideas ought to be expressed. And that's what my amendments are designed to do, and I will take them up. Since the discussion has been broadened, I would say this: The purpose of the recall is to provide a safety valve, an escape hatch, for the anger, the hatred, whatever the negative feelings are that will infect an individual or a part of the voting public to the point where an attempt is made to get rid of the official who has generated that kind of hostility. Because a person such as myself would never be recalled from my
