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district, the white people outside my district decided that they would recall me. But the only way they could recall me is to recall every white senator, too. And they were willing to do that because of the profound disgust they feel toward me. When you're dealing, however, with a specific, discrete voting group, those people, if not allowed to recall for the reasons that they do it, would refer to the Frankenstein remedy. At the end of every Frankenstein movie, when the pictures were in black and white and Boris Karloff was the monster, the villagers did not have a recall process, so you'd see them out there with pitchforks, clubs, and torches, and they'd go to the doctor's castle, or wherever it was that he had chosen to do his evil work, and they would set the place afire. And the poor creature, which was doing nothing other than acting in accord with the nature that his creator gave him, would be the one consumed by the flames, not the doctor, whose name was Frankenstein, by the way. And I think the most profound statement in the original book by Mary Shelley was where she had the monster tell the doctor, you are my creator, but I am your master. And if you read the story, you'll see why he said that, and it is entirely different from what you see in the Hollywood depictions. Right now, the public has an escape valve.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Somebody said, a person may not like the way Senator Loudon sits at his desk, so a recall would be attempted. Let them recall him. I'm sure Senator Loudon would rather people run around with a paper, trying to get signatures, instead of waylaying him with bricks and sticks, and when he goes by, resort to self-help that way. I'm not intending to go into all of that as I present my amendments. But because those matters have been raised, I don't want my failure to say anything about them to suggest my overall attitude toward the recall process. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion. Senator Mines, on the Chambers amendment to the Government, Military and Veterans Affairs Committee amendment.
