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SENATOR D. PEDERSON: I can't remember if it's \$200,000 or \$100,000.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But it's not set...

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: You're talking about the Ryan White Fund?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Whichever. I don't know the name of it, but it would go...

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: The one for medication for AIDS patients?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, maybe there's more than one program.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: If you can wait just a moment...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Sure. If Senator Jensen were here, he could help us out because I had discussed with him the interest that I have.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: I'll try and find it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Well, that's okay, because we're not on that right now. But what I'm going to try to do is get at least \$1 million for addressing...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...the AIDS problem. It is past being grave. To me, it is of greater consequence than the threat of avian flu. AIDS is with us, HIV/AIDS. That's with us now and people are dying from it. When full-blown AIDS breaks out, it is a death sentence. HIV can be treated. Sometimes full-blown AIDS can be staved off. But the problem is such that an expenditure of less than \$1 million would be unconscionable. So I'm just kind of staking out my territory and what I'm going to be fighting for, and if you want to get rid of me for awhile, not completely, on the budget, think about that. Thank you, Madam President.
