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the constitution, and he argued for a federal government that nobody else bought into, nobody. But it was easy for him because he wrote "The Federalist Papers." Madison, J., they were there, but Hamilton did most of the work. I got to tell you, I wouldn't even pretend...I mean I...you could...Alexander Hamilton was a thinker; I'm not.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Friend.

SENATOR FRIEND: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Friend. On with discussion, FA605. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature, I in no way intend or want or like to have anything to do with making anything like this personal in any way with anybody, I really don't. This is an amendment that's been argued on its merits. It's been put into the bill on its merits. It's now being argued to be removed, not on its merits or lack of merits, but for completely extraneous reasons. It's squarely before you. You can do as you want. But I simply say this to you. Do unto me, on this matter, as you would have me do unto you, period.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Louden.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Legislature. I won't have any discussion on Section 1 because I think Senator Chambers can handle that quite well and if that's where his rush is, I certainly wouldn't want to interfere with his rush. But what I would like to ask Senator Friend a question, and that would be on the part of Section 3. Would Senator Friend yield for questions?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Friend, would you yield?

SENATOR FRIEND: Yes, I will.

SENATOR LOUDEN: On the Section 3, there's...oh, it goes into where cities of the primary class can issue citations and stuff
