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substantially dilute the money which is available right now, and it generally is exhausted before the year ends, and Senator Foley is not able to be forthright and point out that he is interested in trying to put pressure, if it can be brought to bear, on a prioritization scheme by HHS to give money to some of these other operations that do not provide all of these services, so that contraceptive services can be excluded by some of these agencies that he is interested in. Now if he is genuine and not disingenuous...he gave an argument against his amendment when he first started. He said that one of these facilities may be located in a certain city, and in order for a woman living in another city to obtain those services, she'd have to travel so far. Well, if the operations he's interested in trying to get funding for do not provide services that those women need, they still are in a situation where they've got to travel the great distance to get those services. And I think we all know which services Senator Foley is interested in excluding and allowing money to go to entities which exclude those services. There is such...

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...an inclination on this floor to pretend that we don't know what the issue is. I'm sure Senator Jensen knows. I'm sure everybody on the floor knows, who has paid attention. I'm opposed to Senator Foley's amendment, and I have such a tremendous amount of opposition that should it be adopted, I will do what I can to try to include contraceptive services, and should that fail, well, we'll just take this thing a step at the time. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator Chambers. (Doctor of the day introduced.) Senator Combs, followed by Senator Don Pederson and Senator Howard. Senator Combs.

SENATOR COMBS: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor and members of the body. I wonder if Senator Chambers would yield to a question, please.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Chambers, would you yield?
