SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, no, page 2 of the amendment. Go to the next page.

SENATOR COMBS: Okay, may prioritize applications for contracts?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, you must have a different version than I have.

SENATOR COMBS: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you see where it says Section 2?

SENATOR COMBS: With a preference? Yeah, with a preference for local health departments. Yeah, that's what I've got here. Hospitals and federally qualified health centers, that's what the Fiscal Office just (inaudible).

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I will read you the part that I'm talking about: The department may contract with a provider who provides some but not all of the services described in this section.

SENATOR COMBS: Oh, okay. That's at the end of the paragraph there. I got it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, so that means some of these services could be excluded, and these entities would still be contracted with by HHS. And I think anyone which is contracted with by HHS should provide all of these services.

SENATOR COMBS: Well, I don't see that listed. Contraception is not listed in paragraph right above that. It's got, shall only be used for the following purposes: reimbursement for the provision of Pap smears, colposcopy—which is checking out the uterus, cervical biopsy, cryotherapy, loop electrosurgical excision procedure—taking, like, warts off the cervix, and other such treatments and procedures as may be developed for the follow up of abnormal Pap smears; diagnosis and treatment of sexually transmitted diseases, including, but not limited to, chlamydia, gonorrhea, HPV—genital warts, and herpes; and associated laboratory and equipment costs and staff training costs related to the use of colposcopy equipment.
