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anyone in this body who would disagree with that, unless you're a person who doesn't like expanding the costs in budgets. You don't dilute programs; you add to them when there's significant need, and it's a significant health issue. This is another agenda; we all know that. Let's preserve what we have. Let someone else come back next year with a bill to put an additional appropriation in, or make an agreement here to come back and put an additional appropriation in the appropriations bill, when there's an opportunity to do that,...

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: One minute.

SENATOR THOMPSON: ...and expand those services to the areas that Senator Stuhr and other people are mentioning. But you don't do that by taking a very limited program that was put in place just to expand an existing set of services, because poor women were presenting with other issues that we wanted to be able to address, which we should be addressing. Continue that process that's been in place, that works well, with an additional appropriation and expand it to other kinds of agencies out there. Let's not spin this into something that it's not. Let's do the right thing. Let the program continue as it has been doing well for many years, and put another appropriation in to expand it to other providers. Thank you.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator Thompson. Senator Preister.

SENATOR PREISTER: Thank you, Honorable President. I won't demote you. I would like to have a dialogue with Senator Jensen, if I might, please. As I try to understand this, I agree with many of the things that Senator Jensen said, but I'm not sure of the effects of doing this.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Jensen, would you yield?

SENATOR PREISTER: Senator Jensen, I agree completely that more screening, more testing, more prevention is extremely important, and that probably we're not doing enough of it. We are appropriating, as I heard you say, just over a half a million dollars to this program, for low-income women to do just those
