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definitive answer. Is this...are these dollars enough? I can't answer that.

SENATOR PREISTER: Okay. That was my concern. Thank you, Senator Jensen. The other issue, then, that it raises is if we're going to make it more available, I fully support that, and I appreciate what Senator Foley is doing, because I would like to make it more available in more locations. So I tend to support what he's doing. If we do that, though, does that then mean that we're going to have more women more available to the service, and then we're going to end up spending more money, we're going to run out of that money, and then there are more women left without the service? So if we're doing this,...

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: One minute.

SENATOR PREISTER: ...then let's, at the same time, appropriate some additional funds, and maybe I can ask Senator Pederson a question, too, but Senator Jensen, your thoughts on that, briefly.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Jensen.

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes. Certainly, Senator Preister, you're absolutely right. And if you do test someone and they've got an STD, let's have the dollars to treat it. If you don't, what good did the tests do? But...and I think many of these...OneWorld in your area does a marvelous job down there. And not only do they do the testing, they'll also do the treatment, if it's necessary, or at least recommend that. We got the same thing in north Omaha with Charles Drew, but we got a lot of communities out throughout the state, who don't have that ability, and I always hope that there are funds for the treatment as well as the testing that follow that.

SENATOR PREISTER: Okay, thank you, Senator Jensen. If I could ask Senator Pederson a question.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Pederson.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Yes.
