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bill,...

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Time, Senator.

SENATOR BROWN: ...but also in what we're actually doing here. Thank you.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Schimek, followed by Senator Preister, followed by Senator Don Pederson. Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I really do think this is a serious discussion, and I really do think it is a discussion about how the services will be provided in the most cost-efficient manner. And I think that Senator Pederson is right. I think that it's not what we usually do, is putting intent language into appropriation bills. And I have to confess, I did not know this amendment was coming up first today, because when I looked at my gadget this morning, I thought it was way down the list. So I got kind of caught unawares and unprepared, and also had a quick press conference out in the Rotunda with the Girl Scouts, had my light on, didn't get to speak, and that's why...one of the reasons I wanted to have a little bit more discussion and hear some more people speak on this issue. And I think some new things have come out in the discussion, like the intent language part of the...of the bill. And Senator Janssen has just notified me by note, which is the reason I was sort of stuttering there at the end, that he would like some of my time and, Senator Janssen, I'd be happy to give you some of my time.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Janssen, about 3, 25.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Foley's proposal, I support that. I support it because of the fact that you're going to get services in a lot more areas in this state, and that needs to be done. But you've heard Senator Pederson talk about, that's fine, but let's put some bucks up there. There's no money appropriated for this. What is going to happen is you're going to dilute the other programs that are in place. Senator Foley, where are the dollars at? Where are they going to come from? Would you tell
