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of the body, you need to have patience with a relatively newcomer here in this great body. I voted no on ending...or calling the question, because I wasn't ready. I hadn't heard enough. I came this morning thinking we were going to talk about the budget. I didn't know this amendment was going to be on there. That's my fault. Have patience with me. But I'm telling you that I didn't have enough information when the question was called. I still probably don't. I don't know if this is an abortion bill, as Senator Chambers says. I don't know whether it's just a good intent to spread services throughout the state as Senator Foley says. But I do know this. You haven't changed the appropriation bill one bit. We don't have any more money. That can tell me only a couple of things. One, it weakens the programs we already have, which maybe is the intent of Senator Foley, I don't know. If we're going to spread this out to more places in the state,...and I agree we should. Young women should have access all over the state to the healthcare they need. I don't happen to see this as an abortion bill, because I would be opposed to an abortion bill. But I see this as a way for especially young people, young women with sexually transmitted diseases, to be able to get the care they need. You can't do it by weakening what we already do. I may vote for Senator Foley's amendment, but we have to have money to do that, and without it, it just shouldn't be. Thank you.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator Kopplin. Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, members, earlier, Senator Foley said that this amendment is about providers. Well, it shouldn't be about providers; it should be about women and their healthcare. And as Senator Preister talked about, it's pretty sad, and I have participated in it, when...on the breast cancer side of it, when there is cancer found through Every Woman Matters, and the answer is, the bad news is you have cancer, and the bad news is that there's nothing that we can...no treatment that's available, there's no money for treatment. And what I'm afraid of is, with the last line, which I've read and read and read, the last line that's in here, which is what it's about, which is to not provide a full range of services to women, that's what our answer is going to be about cervical cancer, about...and about STDs. And north Omaha has the highest STD
