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let's all be fair about how we're doing this here. I urge you to vote no on the reconsideration motion. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Foley. Senator Brown, followed by Senator Janssen.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, I wondered if Senator Foley might yield to a couple questions.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Foley, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR FOLEY: Yes, Mr. President.

SENATOR BROWN: Have you ever been with a woman, a poor woman, who is diagnosed with cancer and is told that she has no treatment opportunities?

SENATOR FOLEY: I had a constituent case that I was very much involved in just this year...excuse me, late last year, where I jumped...she called my office in desperation. She had no health insurance, she had just been diagnosed with cancer; what could I do for her? And my staff and I jumped right into that case, and we got her help.

SENATOR BROWN: How did you get her help?

SENATOR FOLEY: Through the Every Woman Matters Program. She qualified under that program. And she didn't...she never heard of the program.

SENATOR BROWN: And Every Woman...

SENATOR FOLEY: And I researched it and found it, and I called HHS. I said, we've got to do something for this woman. Let's help her out. And then they did. And she is very, very grateful to me, I can tell you that. She's written me letters. I've stayed in contact with her.

SENATOR BROWN: Every Woman Matters initially only had money for diagnosis. It was only after Senator Pederson sponsored some legislation that Every Woman Matters had any opportunity
