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be deterred because Senator Foley spoke prematurely and blamed me for the mess that he has gotten the body in. But they don't call what he's doing filibustering, do they? They don't call these amendments that are pending on the bill filibustering, although they're going to take a lot of time, do they? See, if you all have a lot of people dealing with one idea each, that's all right; but when you have a multifaceted individual, such as myself, who has more than one idea, then what he does is filibustering because he goes beyond what the rest of you are able to do or beyond what the rest of you are willing to do. But at this point, Senator Foley's allegation is not only premature; it's absolutely wrong.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: This provision is wrong and we ought to reconsider. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion? Senator Don Pederson.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, this is an interesting discussion. It strikes at the heart of a lot of our concerns. Our primary concern should be for the welfare of the women that are involved, low-income women. As I said before, I have not heard a lot of complaints, if any, about the existing services that are being rendered. This is...the way this comes up today bothers me a lot. It comes up because Senator Foley had offered an original amendment that had to do with giving money to people who had been victims of crime, and then at the bottom of the list of amendments he came up with this, which he had never talked to me about, never discussed the issue. If he's been talking to Health and Human Services all this time, I think it's not fair to the appropriations process to bring this up at the last minute and leap ahead to the top of the column by having a shell bill or shell amendment there. I just don't think that does the service to the body that it needs. This is an interesting discussion. It should have been brought up on the floor in connection with Health and Human Services, which originally the bill was addressed to them and they advanced the bill to the floor. Now we're talking about it
