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committee, what committee are you thinking it should go to?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It says to the Appropriations Committee, because their bill is the one that has been amended.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Okay, and I respect that. You know, the bill that realistically we're discussing, you know, was heard in HHS Committee, and that's what I was trying to get a clarity on...clarification, as to were you going back to the Appropriations, or are you going back to the original bill that stated that we heard in HHS?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, it would go to the Appropriations Committee, because that bill is not before us.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Okay. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Stuthman. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, when the Speaker spoke, there was blessed quietness because he doesn't often get involved in these discussions. But he and some of us who try to be responsible recognize the importance of a budget bill. But this is where I part company, even with the Speaker. I am not willing to just stand aside and expect people to do the right thing after a presentation such as the Speaker's, which clearly lays out what the right thing is. We knew what the right thing was before he spoke. A majority chose not to do it. I'm the only one who will state what I believe the motivation was, but everybody here knows what the motivation was, especially those who voted for Senator Foley's amendment. And I look at the people who vote for it and I know what their view is on these issues, and they can get as angry as they want to, which would be hypocritical. They can lie, and say that's not the reason, but I know why and they know why. If it were not involved with and tied up in the issue of pro-choice and pro-life, and we were simply looking at an inappropriate amendment to a budget bill, we would have stripped it. We would have discussed what the thrust of that amendment is and we would reach an accommodation before the budget bill ultimately was passed. That is what
