SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Yes, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And when that's transferred over, there will still be some money in the Child Protection Cash Fund?

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: That's right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's what I needed to know,...

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Yeah, \$45,000.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...that the transfer of these funds to ALR...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, thank you. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Don Pederson.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. I see I hit a responsive chord with Senator Flood when we started talking about ALR, and we've all had that same battle on this floor. Senator Chambers noted that there was a problem in some of the counties, the way the district courts were handling fee charges in those connections, and in some cases the ALR problem has existed and has been a real bone for people, because I know some attorneys who have just made a livelihood out of ALR cases, with the likelihood that nothing will ever happen with the case, but they still get the money in advance from the client. And so that's why we transferred it all into the Attorney General's Office, basically, and it's to be administered out that office. So...we used to have claims that Senator Chambers would go through one at a time and say, why, in Lincoln County, did they pay \$500 for every single case that was going on?
