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SENATOR D. PEDERSON: The Superfund site does not cover Mead, because Mead, the part that was handled by the military before, when they had the...

SENATOR PREISTER: Munitions plant.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: ...munitions work, that's being cleaned up by the Corps of Engineers, and the university opted against using Superfund site for cleanup of the low-level, because as you probably know, you get involved with the government handling the thing, and nothing is ever cheaper or better. So the university chose to meet the EPA requirement on its own, and it got an engineer to come up with a bid as to what it would take to clean that up, but Mead is not one of the cleanup sites from the Superfund.

SENATOR PREISTER: Okay. So then the 20 percent match is for the Omaha site and for the Grand Island--for the sites other than Mead?

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: That's correct, that's correct.

SENATOR PREISTER: That clarity helps.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Okay.

SENATOR PREISTER: Thank you very much. And I'm glad that we're appropriating some of that money and setting that aside, because the cleanup is going on, particularly at the Superfund site in Omaha,...

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Yes.

SENATOR PREISTER: ...and we are remediating a lot of those lead-contaminated yards. And so for the state to now provide some of that match, I think is very appropriate, and I appreciate the work.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: This we felt we had to do, and we thought it was appropriate to do, for the very reasons you said, Senator Preister.
