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SENATOR D. PEDERSON: I'd like to find out about the nature of their limitation in that respect before I would agree to something in that regard.

SENATOR BOURNE: I appreciate that, and if you could find that out and let me know off the floor or on the floor, whichever, but thank you, Senator Pederson. I appreciate that.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Thank you.

SENATOR BOURNE: Again, I want to indicate that I support the bill. Procedurally, I think Senator Beutler has a point regarding the A bill. This is much needed; this is an area that is woefully underserved, but I am curious about what are the issues surrounding the prohibition about helping everyone. I think if you are poor and in need of legal services, you should be able to obtain those, regardless of your status. With that, Mr. President, thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Chambers, on AM2733.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, that prohibition touches on federal funds that they might get, and the federal government does not want these kind of services to be provided, so if you're going to try to get federal funds, you have to do what they tell you to do. And they hate these people, as with Dr. Nelson, who wants to build a fence to make sure you keep them out. But there will be little opening ways out in western Nebraska so that they can come in and do things in those fields that people want done, and then when you get farther southwest, there are little openings so they can get through and do the things in the fields out there, too. But in the meantime, you cannot provide them legal assistance, and I believe I'm correct on that.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion? There are no lights on. Senator Pederson, you're recognized to close on your amendment.
