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can't remember what the underlying bill is. It was or is on the agenda to be moved out; we just haven't done that yet. Like I said, we have...it's either...don't hold me to this...it's either 12 or 14 bills that were heard in Judiciary Committee that have been prioritized in some fashion, whether it be an individual priority or a Speaker priority this year. Some of the issues are the sex offender bill, which is a couple hundred pages, a comprehensive package designed to protect our kids in the committee; Senator Friend's bill, which is a comprehensive rewriting of the DUI laws here in Nebraska; a whole host of others. So this was on our radar screen. We have worked on the amendment. And we feel that it was ready to go, in that it was placed on the agenda for our next Executive Session. But unfortunately, we just haven't had that Executive Session. I do want to say that we had a great public hearing on this issue. Senator Synowiecki, of course, introduced the bill. There were a number of neighbors that came from his area, his community, and testified how much of a problem this is in their communities. Frankly, I don't think the municipalities are able to control this type of activity, simply because they don't have enough tools in their toolbox. And the remedy resolves...or, resides with us. I think that this makes sense. As Senator Chambers mentioned in his opening, it is kind of a power disparity relationship. And I think if we go after the purchasers, or the purveyors of the act, I think that will result in a lot more success in controlling this behavior. One of the things we look for in the Judiciary Committee is a balance. And this is kind of continuing...not "kind of," this is continuing with the process or the way that Senator Brashear ran the committee. We are of the opinion there that you do no more than what is necessary to solve the problem. If assessing a Class IV felony to a crime solves the problem, we don't do a Class II. So we try to solve the problem, but we don't try to do it in a way that is draconian, unduly harsh. We don't tend to posture in the committee in terms of hitting somebody with a sledgehammer when a fly swatter would work. And quite frankly, this works in this situation. We go after the people who are the purchasers of this. Oftentimes we heard in testimony today...or, during the hearing, that some of the prostitutes, they're addicted to drugs, they have no other way to earn a living. Sometimes they're forced into doing this. And it's
