We have tried to get those bills out that have been prioritized, and we have done that. I don't believe, last year, there was a bill that remained in committee that wasn't...that was prioritized.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BOURNE: The work that needed to get done, got done. We have one more priority bill to move out this year. We're working on that with Senator Pedersen, and we should have that out soon. Again, this might be appropriate, but I don't know.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Schimek, did you wish to use your 40 seconds? Senator Schimek waives off. Senator Aguilar, followed by Senator Chambers.

SENATOR AGUILAR: Thank you, Mr. President, members. I also am on the Judiciary Committee, and I've had a chance to hear these bills, as well as others. And I will concur with Senator Bourne about, you know, how busy we are. I still have legislation sitting in committee that hasn't come out yet. But I do applaud Senator Stuhr for bringing this forward. I think the body really, truly needs to have this conversation. This is one of the things that really caught my attention in committee. Senator Stuhr brought in a national expert to testify for her, and it was kind of interesting. I did ask a question. I said, do you really think that trafficking occurs in Nebraska? And her answer was very direct when she said, well, we'd all be quite naive if we didn't think it did. We're pretty sure it does. This past weekend, I had the good fortune to attend an immigration task force conference in Tempe, Arizona. As a member of that task force, I was invited to a one-day trip over to Nogales, Arizona. Nogales, Arizona is a bordering town to Sonora, Mexico. And during that trip, we had the good fortune to visit with customs officials, border patrol guards, city officials throughout the town of Nogales, and they talked about some of the problems they have. The border patrol was very specific about the two biggest problems and concerns in that area, and that was illegal immigration of drugs, as well as
