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know how many more providers are out there. I hope there's lots of them, but we don't know that. All we can do is invite them to come in and bid, and hopefully they will, in places like York and Seward and other places, Mullen and other places where women are not being served by the program. Hopefully, they'll come in and offer to serve, and if they do, not only will they have all the dollars available to them that was already appropriated, but I'm willing to put up 20 percent more money under my amendment, 20 percent more women can be served under the Foley amendment. I'm making good on my commitment yesterday to the other members, despite having prevailed twice. I'm showing good faith. There are other providers out there. We know there are, because we've talked to them, but none of us know how many. And those providers will have no start-up costs; they're already doing these kinds of services. It's just a question of paperwork and so forth, in terms of getting reimbursed from HHS. They're doing Pap smears, chlamydia tests and so forth, today. They file an application to HHS under my amendment, they can become providers. I'll ask you to vote red on Senator Janssen's amendment. I think it's extraordinarily high. What program in government gets a 50 percent increase in funding? Hello? No, that is too much. Plus this creative language of tying the Governor's hand, I think that's entirely inappropriate. It takes us down a path we ought not go down.

SENATOR BOURNE: One minute.

SENATOR FOLEY: I think a 20 percent increase in funding is more than generous. It obviously will allow it...for service for many more women, and that's what we ought to be focusing on, and we'll have more providers, as well. I'm putting my name where my commitment was yesterday. I've filed that amendment. It's before you--will be, shortly, when we get to it. But we must first vote red on Ray's...Senator Janssen's amendment, and then we'll get to the other option, which raises...puts more money into the program, and allows for more providers. That's where we ought to be going with healthcare in Nebraska. The other point that needs to be mentioned, Senator Janssen's amendment would strike the low-income requirement if the Governor were to veto even a dollar out of this program. We've never had that in this program, and we need it, because right now there's women
