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provided here today indicates much more depth in terms of geographic coverage than was...than I assumed, or I was working under yesterday.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yeah, there are 14 agencies, but there are this...how many are there, 36, I think Senator Schimek said, where there are sites that they can go and get services from.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: So this map you're providing today reflects, I believe, 24 service sites...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-hum, that's right.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: ...where these services can be accessed.

SENATOR JANSSEN: That's correct.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Not 14, because I'm trying to figure this out, because yesterday I was under the working assumption that there's 14 sites. And it reflects, then, this new information reflects much fewer gaps, if you will, in service territory.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: You pointed out O'Neill. You pointed out perhaps maybe Broken Bow lacking some service. Now your amendment...you are then intending--and correct me if I'm wrong--you're intending to leave the existing service sites whole?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Absolutely.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: And then if we bring on more service sites, we will logically need more appropriations to do that.

SENATOR JANSSEN: That's correct.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Okay, I'm just trying to conceptualize what you're trying to do. So you want to keep these whole, the existing service sites,...
