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probably put some more clinics, and I think that's what some of the additional funds could be used for, as well as perhaps supplementing some of the funds that are already being used, because if we really did the inflation for all of those years, I'm sure you would see a huge loss in terms of real dollars.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Further discussion? Senator Foley.

SENATOR FOLEY: Thank you again, Mr. President. I wonder if Senator Janssen would yield to some questions, please.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Janssen, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR JANSSEN: I certainly will if I can, Senator Foley.

SENATOR FOLEY: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Before lunch Senator Synowiecki was on the record with you and he asked you whether or not, if your amendment is adopted, all of the existing providers would be fully protected. In other words...and by that, I'm not sure that's the phrase he used, but in other words, they would receive everything that they've always received in the most recent year. Is that your intent? Is that what happens here if your amendment is adopted?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Hopefully it would, yeah. Yes. Yeah.

SENATOR FOLEY: But not necessarily. I mean, let me just give an example. In Lincoln, Lancaster County, there's one provider today, and as I've been saying for two days now, that's not enough for Lancaster County, a quarter million people. Let's just say hypothetically that a year from now, instead of there being one provider, there's six providers. Would that one original provider get everything that they got last year, when there was only one provide, as they would if there were six providers?

SENATOR JANSSEN: With the amount...you mean with the amount of funding there is now?
