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given provider might receive.

SENATOR JANSSEN: How many extra providers do you think that you would have with your amendment?

SENATOR FOLEY: Well, that's...and that's the big unknown, Senator.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Uh-huh.

SENATOR FOLEY: I don't know. I mean, we're hoping. We've made this thing...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR JANSSEN: How many are you hoping for?

SENATOR FOLEY: Well, I would hope...I mean, well, I used the example yesterday of the Every Woman Matters Program of 450 providers.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, you know...

SENATOR FOLEY: I don't know if we need 450 to serve the state.

SENATOR JANSSEN: But those providers still have to bid.

SENATOR FOLEY: Yes, that's right.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes, they do.

SENATOR FOLEY: They have to bid. And some of them, under the language we adopted yesterday, get a preference. Hospitals, the federally qualified health centers, the county health departments, to the extent that they might be interested, they would be treated as preferred providers.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, I would imagine they probably should be.

SENATOR FOLEY: Yeah, and I agree with you. That's why it was written the way it was. But if you've got...if you've got new
