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SENATOR BROWN: Thank you, Mr. President. I will be supporting this amendment with some reluctance, but because I believe that it is the right thing to do for women, I will do it. I'm still troubled by the absolute "disingenuity" of the Foley...the original Foley amendment and the original argument that more clinics, absent money, would equal more women being served. That is absolutely incomprehensible to me, and that's why what Senator Janssen, Senator Pederson, and others have done is at least bringing us some measure of sanity to this discussion. Senator Foley said earlier that the increase that's being projected of 50 percent is absolutely unreasonable if you look at other lines in the budget. But if you look at the increase in Medicaid over the time period when we first put in close to the \$500,000, that increase has been almost 100 percent. So we're only increasing this by 50 percent so it hasn't even kept up with our spending in Medicaid as a whole. Senator Stuthman talked about being worried because of a lack of funds, but the real issue about the underlying amendment, the Foley amendment, was not about funding. It was not about services. It was about who would provide those services. So Senator Stuthman, if he needs to be concerned, should be concerned that his facility that he believes in and has been providing those services might not receive as much in the future, because there is no guarantee under this language that the existing providers who have been doing such yeoman's work in providing services to women will continue to be able to receive the grants, especially with the expansiveness of whoever might be able to provide the services, and not requiring the full range of services. So I will thank only those members of the Legislature who argued for more services for women, rather than for those who argued only for controlling who provided those services. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Brown. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion of Janssen amendment, FA608. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask Senator Foley a question or two, if he's available.
