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SENATOR FOLEY: Oh, I'm sorry. (Laugh)

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Kruse, followed by Senator Bourne.

SENATOR KRUSE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and members. I will be very brief. I would speak to the situation on the floor with the competing two amendments, so to speak, and just make the observation that these are really equivalent, except for the amount of money in them. I will support Senator Janssen's amendment to the amendment, but it really doesn't change anything. I just urge the body to set aside from our minds the condition of a Governor's veto. It really has nothing to do...they're both equivalent here. If Senator Janssen's amendment, in its present situation, would be amended, the Governor has a right to change the language because that's intent language. So, you know, it just doesn't make any difference. The only difference between the two is the amount that's in them, and I'd urge the body to take out of our thoughts the "what if the Governor," because that really doesn't relate to the complications of the decisions before us. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Kruse. On with discussion of FA608. Senator Bourne, followed by Senator Foley.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. I was visiting with Ron Raikes about some education issues, so you can understand why I might be a little bit lost as to what Senator Janssen's amendment does at this particular point. Senator Janssen, would you yield to a question or two, please?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Janssen, would you yield?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Certainly.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you. Senator Janssen, earlier this morning...or, actually, let's go back a day. The other day when we had talked, I had said that, while I appreciate your efforts at compromise, the Governor could veto out your money and could not, is unable to, veto out Senator Foley's language. So I
