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tourists and many other things, it's those that have a leadership and a vision. There is plenty of grants and money out there to help, but if somebody is just waiting on something to happen because there's money coming down, it's not going to happen. And I really do support the money that's there now already. And Senator Beutler, I guess I'd like to ask you a couple of questions. Does...this one-time \$5 million would just go into the pot, that the interest would be generated from that would be used, then, for the...for whatever might be in the humanities and arts?

SENATOR BAKER: Senator Beutler, would you...would...

SENATOR KREMER: How do you apply...I'm sorry.

SENATOR BAKER: Would you respond, Senator Beutler?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Sure.

SENATOR KREMER: How do you...do you make applications for grants, or is it applications come from the bottom up, or from the top down, or...

SENATOR BEUTLER: It is a grant application process, Senator, yes.

SENATOR KREMER: And I know in several times we've had some orchestra or band or somebody come in, and it's all sponsored by the humanities council, but a lot of times that really is initiated on the local level, and you have some sharing in there, too.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yeah. A number one user of the Cultural Trust fund are the public schools and the school kids around the state.

SENATOR KREMER: But, and I guess I kind of think it's a great project, but then, where do we stop? It's always just a little bit more, and a little more, and a little bit more, and one time always goes into many more than one time, so I reluctantly will probably not support the \$5 million, but the bringing it down to
