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working, participating, being able to live in a way that's not only beneficial to them and their families, but also to our bottom line. So another good reason to do it is because it saves us money. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Brown. Senator Byars, AM2731.

SENATOR BYARS: Thank you, Senator Cudaback and colleagues. I rise in support of the Chambers amendment, working in the healthcare industry and with those people that are affected through either the lack of or the wonderful technologies that we have available to us today. I don't know of anything out there, a disease, that is more debilitating and more cruel than HIV. And I would stand in support of this additional funding. I think it's a resource that's needed, not only for those who suffer from this disease today, but unfortunately, for those who will suffer from it tomorrow. And I think we need to have the resources available to do everything we can to combat the disease, through education and through treatment, and I stand in support of the Chambers amendment.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Byars. Senator Chambers, there are no further lights on. You're recognized to close.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I do appreciate all those who commented. And following the lead of Senator Brown, who is following the lead of our Speaker, I will keep my remarks very brief. I hope that you will adopt this amendment, and I will ask for a call of the house, and accept a machine vote.

SENATOR CUDABACK: There's been a request for a call of the house. All in favor of the house going under call vote aye; those opposed vote nay. Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 22 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, to place the house under call.
