SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right. Thank you. And I didn't want to seem like I was saying something that's not so. I'd like to ask Senator Adrian Smith a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Smith, would you yield?

SENATOR SMITH: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Smith, you had said something about, a line has to be drawn somewhere. Is that correct?

SENATOR SMITH: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Members of the Legislature, \$10 million for ethanol is not a place where you, after doing that, you can tell me a line ought to be drawn that will hurt poor people. I know people who live in public housing. I know people who would be on the street if they couldn't have access to public housing. And generally, these are women with children. I even had to get involved in an issue related to public housing in Lincoln because of what was going to be done to a woman with several children. And had I not used my position on the floor of the Legislature and threatened reprisal against the city of Lincoln, that woman and her children would have been thrown out for a reason that they ought not to have been kicked out. People don't care about poor people, but I do. With all this talk of negotiation and compromise, I was not included. So they can further compromise by getting 33 votes for this bill. I'm glad that Senator Bourne pointed out that the bill Senator Landis suggested be a vehicle for attaching Senator Brown's bill carries a kill motion from Senator Landis. Senator Brown mentioned the relatively short time remaining in the session. You know that means nothing to me. I don't have to be a good guy to anybody. I was not a part of any negotiations. I was not a part of any agreements. And I'd like to ask Senator Matt Connealy a question.
