get out 5 to 3. Senator Raikes opposed it, I opposed it, I'm not sure...Senator Redfield opposed it as well. I don't think I'm bound and determined to vote for an amendment that I wouldn't vote for as a bill. It was in the committee and I didn't vote for it there. When it gets offered to a legitimate bill over here, I'm going to vote against it over there as well. As a matter of fact, I don't support that bill. But you know what, offering the Brown bill doesn't make the Synowiecki bill any better from my perspective at the moment. So I've been totally consistent. I don't want to vote for the Brown idea, and it doesn't make a difference what home you want it for. For those of you who want to separate--for those of you, not me--for those of you who want to separate it from this tax package, you will have a forum in which you can vote for it and support it, and yet not do it in the context of this measure, which has whatever troubled future it has ahead of it, given Senator Chambers' opposition. And the ethanol money that's in there and whether or not it, you know, is too rich as far as the rest of you may be concerned, but you can separate those issues. There's a second track for this. We were always going to have problems with this bill. Senator Chambers told me very early in the session there's only one tax change he wanted, and that was the construction sales tax change. I've been on notice for a long time that this is going to be...we're going to spend a long time today on this bill from many different sources. I think the question that you want to ask yourself is, do you support the package as it exists, or do you want to do other things? If you want to support the package and other things, I think there's another vehicle to do it. But if not, stick it in here. Vote for the Brown amendment and add it if you want to. I'll be voting no. I think there's another path. But you don't have to do that. You could put it here. Senator Chambers, I'll give you the remainder of my time.
