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SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: If it goes, it goes. It doesn't cost us money. I know Senator Byars cares deeply about it. I understand it. It's not as if these are people that...you know, that nobody is going to get rich off this deal. On the other hand, if in fact they're not paying taxes now, there's no reason why you have to pass this amendment or this...to add it to the bill at the current time, either. But that's why the action has been taken as it has. I will resist the amendment in this context. I'll think about it in a different context.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Landis. Senator Chambers, followed by Senator Byars.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask Senator Byars a question or two.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Byars, would you...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Byars, what does "developmental disabilities" mean?

SENATOR BYARS: Developmental disabilities is an interpretation of a person who has not, through medical impairment, developed at a rate that we would consider normal. It could be a disability that is mental, could be a disability that was physical, could be a combination of both. It could be a situation it's a cognitive issue of an individual being able to understand, to verbalize. Some individuals with developmental disabilities are not as profoundly disabled as others.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Byars, could it relate to emotional immaturity or lack of development?

SENATOR BYARS: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Could the circumstances under which a child lives result in some kind of emotional or mental disability that will qualify him or her? Or must a person be born with this
