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to start enforcing this, then we need to put in statute that we aren't collecting that sales tax. I would yield the balance of my time to Senator Chambers, if he would like it.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, two, forty.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Byars. I will support Senator Byars' amendment, and it wouldn't come as a surprise to him. And even if there were some kind of tax relief that would be enjoyed by an organization that provided these very needed services, that would be a type of tax relief which I would not be opposed to. First of all, it's not going to be that much. Secondly, when you look at the social good that would be derived from it, it's easy to find a justification. Senator Landis had talked about not being able to predict. So I would like to invite "Squire Wehrbein," Senator Wehrbein, into the discussion.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Wehrbein, would you yield?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Wehrbein, down through the years while you have been here, when ethanol issues would come up, I generally would be adamantly opposed at the start.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would that be an accurate statement?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, that's true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Have there, nevertheless, been occasions when you and I would have discussions and my opposition would soften and we'd meet somewhere between your total favoring of the issue, my total opposing of the issue, and we'd meet somewhere in the middle and agree on what people characterize as a compromise?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, sir.
