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the preacher was making all these flowery statements, so she ran up there and the preacher said, woman, what's the matter with you? Somebody grab that woman. She looked in the box and when the preacher asked again, what's the matter with you, and Senator Combs knows about this, she said, I had to look in the box because the man you're describing is not the man I was married to. But what I described was an accurate picture of you, Senator Landis, when you're at your best,...

SENATOR LANDIS: Ah.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...when you're acting in accord with the angels of your higher nature. Unfortunately, this bill is not one of those times. Did you say earlier that the Governor supports this package as it exists now, or did somebody say that...

SENATOR LANDIS: I think that would be a fair characterization,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...in general?

SENATOR LANDIS: ...yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Thanks. That's the point that I wanted to be sure on, because I've been saying the Governor supports this. And I'm really not privy to the Governor's views on things such as this, but he has made his views clear on another matter and he did it in a way that I think was politically and morally reprehensible. I live in Omaha. I went to the Omaha Public Schools from kindergarten through high school, and I witnessed the discrimination and the diminishing quality of education provided in the schools attended by a majority of the black children. So when the Governor jumps into the middle of a situation and uses code words to let the white racists know where he is, I cannot just let that pass. He did it publicly, and he's putting out radio ads. You know who he reminds me of? Orval, Lester, and George. For those who don't know it, these are notorious racist southern governors who did everything they could to hurt the interests of black people and our children. Their last names: Orval Faubus; Lester Maddox,
