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SENATOR CHAMBERS: How many pipelines are you aware of that exist and are in operation now moving ethanol?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I don't think they could use ethanol in pipelines. It's too corrosive.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So trucks and...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Rail (inaudible).

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...trains are the way they move it.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I will say, back to your petroleum-based diesel fuel, we're using more soy oil, if you know, and there is a number that I don't know off the top of my head that is being used. So that is renewable energy and that's rapidly increasing, using soybean oil and other oil.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But soy is not ethanol, is it?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: But that is...it is a nonpetroleum base, is what I was getting at.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion. Senator Cunningham.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Thank you, Senator Cudaback and members. I'm going to be brief. I do stand up in opposition to this amendment, but Senator Landis, Connealy, Wehrbein and others have explained the situation pretty well. But I think that ethanol is one of the greatest things that has come along for rural Nebraska. Senator Chambers, I know you have talked about the studies that have been done and it talks about petroleum, we
