SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Brown. Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: I'll waive this opportunity to talk. I'll put my light back on after Senator Chambers, and then I'll make some more comments.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, you're recognized.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, there are some matters that affect me much more profoundly than others. I told Senator Redfield that when I leave this place I may need to find or take up residency in public housing. Unlike my colleagues on the floor, I don't have a special company or interest group that I would work for that allows me time off to come to the Legislature, then pays me a very good salary; maybe I earn it and maybe I don't. My pride is such that I could not do that. I cannot work for somebody. So when you have a lot of pride, there is a price that you pay. As a matter of fact, and Senator Pahls is probably ahead of me, if you look at the word "pride," you know that in some words they say if you change the Y to I and add ED then you make the past tense of a word, and they all have all kind of little rules like that to help you remember how to do this. If you took the word "pride" and eliminated that stem on the D and reversed what you had left, you would then have "price." So pride carries a price, and some people are willing to pay it, others are not willing, and some cannot pay it. But I can and I will. So if I had to live in a cave and scratch in the gravel for food with the chickens, that's what my pride would lead me to do, if it was necessary to do that to retain my pride, meaning, I don't have to stick my hand out to anybody and say, give me a crust of bread, give me a drink of water. But not everybody is put together that way. And nobody should have to live in that way, under those circumstances. So knowing how many poor women there are with children, who even now are trying to find a halfway decent place to stay--notice I said "halfway decent," not "decent"--this little baby step is one moving in the right direction. If I cannot give somebody a full meal, that doesn't mean I won't give
