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They may be working for the minimum wage. They may have just come off of some subsidies from the government, and they're struggling. And I think that's exactly the population that we want to help just get ahead. And I think the EITC is also something that benefits our economy, because these are funds that go right back into purchasing necessary goods, paying down loans, credit cards, buying transportation so that people can get to work in a reliable vehicle, and purchase appliances that help our main street businesses. These are dollars that recirculate within our economy over and over again. The EITC, I think, has proven itself at the federal level, and I think it would benefit Nebraska. And so that's one of the portions that we're talking about here. It's what Senator Landis alluded to. The bracket portion of the income taxes I alluded to earlier in my opening on the original bill. And there's one piece in there, in the committee amendment, when we adjusted it down to make it a little more affordable, that I think is very significant, and that's the head of household rate that we put in there. We actually, rather than putting it at the top bracket, we gave more benefit at the second bracket. And the reason we did is because, again, these are the single parents who are struggling very, very hard to meet all of the expenses--day-care and housing and children's clothes supplies for school, and all the things that they have to come up with out of their income. And so when I looked at the income tax reports that we have from the Department of Revenue and looked at where, in fact, our head of household fell in an average or an annual earnings, we actually had more people at And so in order to give more help at that these lower levels. level for head of households, we adjusted it in the committee amendment that is going to come before you. What I'm trying to tell you is that the Revenue Committee has worked very, very hard on the details of this bill. This is more than just philosophy or big-picture vision. This is a bill where we have worked very, very hard on every tiny detail. Senator Janssen's part, the sales tax on labor, we looked at, well, how could we it affordable and still do it, take out all the complications, find a way that businesses who can expense it and are not harmed by it in the same way that the resident, the homeowner, would be hurt, how can we adjust it? And I think that we've spent a long time doing that. I think that we'll
