certainly is to the appearance a degree of disorder, an absence of quietude, and those are the kinds of things that make this a different area to legislate in. But since the body was of a mind to do it, I was trying to include language that would give it a chance to withstand a court challenge. But I do have some questions in my own mind about the wisdom of doing this. The only reason I'm going along is because the area which is being dealt with is different from ordinary occurrences. Not sharing in the attitudes that people have who engage in funerals, organized mourning, and so forth, I have to take their word for what this means to them. And as long as there is not an undue restriction on people who want to express their opposition to the speech which is being expressed by virtue of the funeral itself, then I can go along with these feelings that others express. And I have lost family members, but funerals I do not attend, wakes, if that's what they're called, visitations, viewings--none of that. But other people do, so what you see in my amendment is my offering to those to whom this activity which surrounds the disposition of a departed person, that's my contribution to those people. And if you accept the amendment or if you don't accept it, it's all the same to me. But in view of the general attitude that seems to be expressed here, the amendment will be adopted. But I hope that we will keep in mind that we should not willy-nilly pass laws that infringe...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...on the rights of people to assemble to express what their thoughts are. The language in these pictures that Senator Friend has shown to us is language I would not use, and jestingly, I told him there's at least one of their signs that I agree with, but I won't tell you all what it is, because you all are so solemn, you all are so serious now, that your face would probably break if you tried to smile. But that's the amendment that you see on your gadget, and Mr. President, I suggest that we adopt it. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You've heard the closing on the Chambers amendment, AM2779. The question before the body is, shall that amendment be adopted? All in favor of the motion vote aye; opposed, nay. The question before
