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because...before I ask you any more questions, but this is not something I can support. And when this bill came and I read the original form of it that Senator Aguilar had, I didn't have problems with it in terms of supporting it. But if this language is adopted, I'm not going to support it. I think this is money thrown away, it's not going to produce anything of value, in my opinion. We've giving no legislative guidance, we're not stating any outcomes that must be met. We're letting this commission decide everything from A to bullfrog, of what these grants will consist of, how many there are to be. There's no limit on how much a grant can be for. So there's no way I could support this. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR BOURNE: Time. Senator "Synowhiskey."

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Thank you, Senator "Courne," members of the Legislature. You know, I think we just have to make a judgment call relative to this appropriation. The Appropriations Committee in its package has appropriated \$5.75 million that goes to and through the Community Corrections Council for various programs relative to our response, if you will, to the methamphetamine epidemic, and these include treatment, evaluative funds, specialized courts, really the whole gamut--day and evening reporting centers on behalf of the probation department. So ultimately, it's a judgment call on behalf of the body, relative to if you want to put the other \$200,000 in for prevention activities. The Appropriations Committee, I think, has been responsive relative to the methamphetamine epidemic in what we're doing in an expansion of the community corrections. I would have a question, though, for Senator Burling, if you could yield, please.

SENATOR CUDABACK PRESIDING

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Burling, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR BURLING: Yes.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Senator Burling, you have in here some kind of reference to the Community Corrections Council. It says in
